Democratic Sen. Klein Strikes **Power-Share Deal** With GOP

In an unprecedented move that has angered local Democratic lawmakers, Bronx State Senator Jeff Klein and his conference of Independent Democrats struck a power-sharing agreement with Republicans last week.

That means Klein, who represents a sprawling Bronx district that now runs from the far east Bronx through Bedford Park into Riverdale, will become co-president of the Senate with Republican Majority Leader Dean Skelos starting at the beginning of the new year.

The pair, already being dubbed "Skleinos," will become Leaders of their respective conferences and share equal authority over committee chairmanships, board appointments, budget talks and which bills will come up for a vote.

For the past two years, Klein and the Independent Democrats have worked closely with Republicans.

In a joint statement, Skelos and Klein say the agreement "marks a bold new chapter in this partnership that will allow the Senate to continue pushing New York State forward, while ensuring that there will be no returning to the (continued on p. 2)

At Embattled Clinton, a Giant Tree **Shows Its Strong Roots**

School spirit was loud and clear last Thursday night when students, teachers, alumni and members of the community rallied together to "save" DeWitt Clinton High School after the Department of Education handed the school its second consecutive "F" on its 2011-2012 progress report, which could lead to major changes at the school or possible closure.

Clinton's auditorium was flooded with people and emotions ran high as speakers took turns showing their support for keeping Clinton, one of the last "traditional" high schools in the Bronx, alive. The rest of the borough's high schools, including local northwest Bronx institutions like Walton, Kennedy and Evander Childs, have been broken up into several smaller, specialize schools. But Clinton and its deep roster of dedicated and prestigious alumni have kept Clinton intact.

Gerard Pelisson stood in front of a defiant crowd of students, alumni, faculty and concerned local resident to voice his support for the embattled school he loves.

"This is a school that is a giant tree with deep roots," Pelisson said to the raucous crowd. "The tree is in good shape and you are the proof of it."

Pelisson, co-author of "The Castle on the Parkway: The Story of New York City's DeWitt Clinton High School and Its Extraordinary Influence on American Life" and former Clinton teacher, was just one of many

speakers who took turns showing their support for keeping the school alive and in one piece.

Clinton has seen its share of turbulence since its ranking among the top 100 high schools in the country just 13 years ago. It now joins the chopping block with a reported 60 other public high schools after the Department of Education handed Clinton's its second consecutive "F" on the 2011-2012 progress report.

The Department of Education gave the school a "B" on College and Career Readiness but an "F" in student (continued on p. 15)

In The Public Interest

Longtime Resident Shot and Killed on Decatur Ave.

A popular Norwood man was shot and killed during an early Sunday morning dispute on Decatur Avenue, just two blocks from his home.

According to NYPD spokesman James Duffy, the deadly confrontation took place outside of a three-family home at 3089 Decatur Ave., between Mosholu Parkway North and East 204th Street at 2:27 a.m., on Sunday, Dec. 9.

After responding to a report of a male shot, police arrived on the scene to find Gary Rodriguez, 46, of 3285 Decatur Ave., with a gunshot wound to his chest. Rodriguez was transported to Montefiore Medical Center where he was pronounced dead on arrival.

"We have no arrests at this time and the investigation is ongoing," Duffy said. "We don't know what this was all about. We don't have any motive or any suspect information."

According to a friend of the victim, who asked not to be identified, the perpetrator "tried to rob him of his cash. I know he got into a fight and once he got to the fight, he was getting the better end of it, and the kid pushed him off and just shot him."

According to the friend, in the moments after he was shot from just several feet away, at least one witness heard Rodriguez ask the killer, "Why did you do this to me?"

A cell phone lying on the sidewalk within the taped-off crime scene, rang several times in the hours after the shoot-

Rodriguez, who friends say was a hardworking scrap metal worker, has lived in the area with his family for the last 20 to 25 years.

During the monthly 52nd Precinct Community Council meeting, held at Fordham Methodist Church on Thursday, Nov. 29, Deputy Inspector Joseph Dowling said that only one of the precinct's three homicides this year remained unsolved.

Coincidentally, that unsolved murder was a drug-related homicide inside an apartment on Decatur Avenue near East Gun Hill Road, just three blocks from last weekend's shooting. But Dowling added, "That's a long term investigation, but we will have that closed, just a matter of letting the investigation develop."

It may have been before Dowling's deployment to the 52nd Precinct, but res-

failed leadership of the past."

Without mentioning names, it's clear they are talking about Democrats, who struggled to stay united during their twoyear run in charge of the Senate during 2009 and 2010. During that time, Bronx State Senator Pedro Espada infamously took the Senate hostage and extorted Democrats for a plum leadership position in exchange for his loyalty.

Some Democrats say Klein's move is similar to Espada's and flies in the face of the state's voters, who appear to have elected a majority of Democrats in the State Senate. (Two upstate races have yet to be determined, but Democrats could have as many as 33 of the Senate's 63

"This is not a coalition but a coup against all New Yorkers who voted for Democratic control of the Senate and a progressive state government," said Senate Democratic spokesman Mike Murphy.

Klein, however, insists the power-sharing deal will allow more progressive bills to see light on the Senate floor.

In recent interviews, Klein has specifically mentioned a minimum wage hike, campaign finance reform and changes to the police department's stop-and-frisk policies. (Klein did not respond to specific questions for this article by press

Malcolm Smith, an African-American senator from Queens who was majority leader during the Espada debacle in 2009, joined Klein's conference on the day the power-sharing deal was announced, becoming its first minority member.

"Over the past two years, Senator Klein and his colleagues in the IDC have shown that they're driven by policy, not

politics," Smith said in a statement. "They have delivered on an impressive bipartisan agenda, have stayed true to their Democratic principles, and have laid the groundwork for an historic bipartisan model of governing."

Bronx State Senator Gustavo Rivera, who worked hard this fall to win back the majority for Democrats, is skeptical, saying the move essentially keeps Republicans in power when the public voted them out.

He said the new "so-called coalition will present watered-down versions of progressive issues that we, as Democrats. feel are the best way to move New York forward."

Rivera said the "devil is in the details." Because the coalition will choose chairmanships, Rivera said it will also be writing the final drafts of bills that reach the floor for a vote, which means "the bulk of us [Democrats] — 27 of us — will be excluded from the conversation."



Klein's Power Play

Now the pressure is on Jeff Klein.

As the head of New York's Independent Democratic Caucus in the State Senate, Klein could have chosen to throw his group's support behind either Republicans or Democrats and ensure majority rule for either party.

The case for Democrats: (1) Klein is a Democrat. (2) Klein is from and represents the Bronx, which is so overwhelmingly Democratic that Republicans often run candidates who don't know they are running until their names show up on ballots. (3) More than 90 percent of Bronx voters voted for Barack Obama, a Democrat. (4) Registered Democrats outnumber Republicans more than 2 to 1 in New York State. (5) Despite obvious GOP gerrymandering, Democrats appear to outnumber Republicans in the Senate (though final tallies for two upstate races are still to be determined).

The case for Republicans: (1) Republicans love Klein so much they drew him a district that swept through the Bronx like a heat-seeking missile in search of every white vote in the borough. (2) Klein immediately becomes one of the four most powerful politicians in Albany. (3) (Still thinking...)

Klein, of course, chose to side with Republicans. In a joint statement with Republican Majority Leader Dean Skelos (they are calling the new leadership arrangement "Skleinos"), Klein said the agreement will "allow the Senate to continue pushing New York State forward, while ensuring that there will be no returning to the failed leadership of the past."

That last line is a direct hit on Democrats during their largely unsuccessful two-year stint back in control of the Senate after four decades of Republican rule. Democrats rightfully place much of the blame for that debacle on former Bronx Senator and convicted felon Pedro Espada.

But the failed leadership and dysfunction in Albany goes back much farther than the last time Democrats controlled the Senate. Espada certainly drove the body deeper, and more publicly, into dysfunction than ever before, but Republicans played a large role in Albany's paralysis for years before he arrived on the scene.

It appears voters (and/or federal prosecutors) weeded out the bad apples like Espada and, through the power of the ballot box, Democrats were poised to take another crack at leading the Senate.

Before the votes were counted, however, Klein made his move. It gives him more power than ever before and a chance to make a huge impact. But will it benefit Bronxites?

Klein says it's all about policy and being produc-

tive. And yes, the legislature was more productive during the last two years under Republicans, than the previous two years under Democrats. But that agenda was driven by Governor Andrew Cuomo, a moderate Democrat, not Republicans. Their biggest win was passing gay marriage, a progressive issue. And that productivity noticeably slowed this year.

Klein's position will bring more resources to his office and more clout for the Bronx, but how will it play out legislatively?

He says he's committed to pushing progressive bills onto the floor, including legislation that would raise the state's minimum wage, which languished last year in the GOP-controlled Senate. The hike would go a long way toward helping Bronxites. The Bronx is woefully under-employed, meaning many in the borough have jobs that don't pay them enough to pay their bills. The Bronx needs a mandated wage hike.

We don't doubt that a minimum wage bill will come to the floor in 2013. But what will it look like? Will it be tied to inflation, as Democrats have pushed for and would allow workers in those jobs to better keep pace with the cost of living? Or will it be a one-time hike, which Republicans would prefer, that will be outdated in two years?

Once again, Klein will have to decide what side he's on. And we'll be watching.




My great holiday gift was a car that came from my dad last Christmas and now I'm making money. Jason Santana


My best Christmas gift was the day my grandson Jason was born, he's my angel. Maria Pucci



progress, student performance, and school environment, making Clinton's overall score 37.2 out of 100. However, students felt the DOE's grade was an inaccurate portrayal of their school and, in response, conducted their own study on student life and academics and graded their school a "B-".

"It was fantastic to see how much the students talked about the history and legacy of their school," said Pelisson, referring to the student survey.

Many Clinton students have taken great pride in sharing a campus that boasted alumni such as Ralph Lauren, James Baldwin, Tracy Morgan and Stan Lee (creator of Spider-Man, the Fantastic Four and the X-Men), along with a slew of Oscar, Emmy, and Tony winners, 11 Pulitzer Prize winners and five Olympic medalists. The school also prides itself on hosting more than 57 programs and activities, including 30 athletic teams, a Junior ROTC training program, a literary magazine, student newspaper and the esteemed M.A.C.Y. Honors program.

"We're only as strong as our weakest link and it doesn't look like we have one here today," said former Clinton student Walter Simons, as the packed auditorium clapped and cheered. Simons came to Clinton as an at-risk youth and described himself as a "truant student," but said because of the faculty, programs and education he received at Clinton, he was able to graduate.

The DOE is beginning "early engagement" talks to determine reform efforts that could lead to an overhaul of the school's faculty or even closure. The results of those talks won't be known until early next year, but it's clear where the school community and its supporters stand.

"I promise you that I will work very hard to try to convince those at the Department of Education not to close this school," said local Councilman Oliver Koppell. "You should know that Council Member Oliver Koppell strongly supports the maintenance and the continuation and the future of DeWitt Clinton High School!"


