She added, "It's something



Dinowitz Bill to Enhance Housing Security for Older Adults Becomes Law

New York City Council passed what was described as a groundbreaking piece of legislation, sponsored by Bronx Council Member Eric Dinowitz (C.D. 11), on Thursday, Feb. 8. The bill aims to ease the burden on the City's older adults living in City-run, Mitchell-Lama housing when applying to the older adult rent freeze program.

According to officials from the councilman's office, the newly passed bill, Int. No. 0025A-2024, establishes a streamlined system through which Senior Citizen Rent Increase Exemption (SCRIE) forms are pre-filled with essential information for tenants residing in such Cityrun, Mitchell-Lama housing.

They said the initiative is designed not only to assist individuals renewing their rent freeze benefits, but also to proactively reach all eligible tenants, particularly older adults, who they said are among the most vulnerable in the City, and often live on fixed incomes.

The councilman said having grown up in Mitchell-Lama housing, himself, he understands, first-hand, how important affordable housing is to uplifting communities. "Everyone deserves to age with dignity and security," Dinowitz said. "When we talk about affordable housing, it's not just about a roof over our heads, it's about the life-sustaining stability that affordable housing provides."

The bill is a win for the councilman, who represents the Bronx neighbor-

hoods of Norwood, Bedford Park, Kingsbridge Heights-Van Cortlandt Village, Kingsbridge-Marble Hill, Riverdale-Spuyten Duyvil, Williamsbridge-Olinville, Eastchester-Edenwald-Baychester, Wakefield-Woodlawn, as well as green areas, Woodlawn Cemetery, Van Cortlandt Park, and Bronx Park.

Situated on the border of Norwood and Bedford Park, within walking distance to NYC Health + Hospitals/North Central Bronx and Montefiore Medical Center, and adjacent to the Mosholu Parkway subway station is the North Bronx landmark that is Tracey Towers, a Mitchell Lama, twin tower housing complex, home to several older adults living in its 871 one and two-bedroom apartments

The Towers, which opened in 1974 and which were designed by architect, Paul Rudolph, are part of NYC Department of Housing, Preservation & Development (HPD)'s Mitchell Lama affordable rental and cooperative program for moderate and middle-income families. The housing development is the 2nd largest Bronx Co-op, according to HPD, and is also home to a large Ghanaian community, among other residents. Many joyfully attended last year's Black History Month on-site celebration hosted by State Sen. Gustavo Rivera (S.D. 33) and others.

The latest bill mandates that HPD utilize existing data collected from city-run Mitchell-Lama tenants, such

as age and income, to automatically populate SCRIE forms. Under this bill, HPD must also digitalize all income affidavits that applicants provide. This new system not only streamlines the application process but also ensures that eligible individuals are reached proactively.

The pre-filled information also recognizes the diverse needs of older adults, some of whom may not have access to SCRIE or be aware of this program. According to the councilman's office, this approach aligns with the council member's commitment to accessibility and inclusivity.

In 2021, the councilman's father, Assemblyman Jeffrey Dinowitz (A.D. 81), who represents much of the same section of the North Bronx, together with former State Sen. Alessandra Biaggi (S.D. 34) passed a piece of State legislation to ensure Co-op shareholders could access reverse mortgages on cooperative apartments in the same way as other types of homeowners can.

Of the latest bill, the councilman concluded, "With this bill, we will ensure that our older adults can live independently and with peace of mind. By simplifying the SCRIE process for cityrun, Mitchell-Lama tenants, we're not only giving much-needed support to our older neighbors, but also setting a precedent for future measures to enhance the affordable housing stock, especially for vulnerable populations."

Bedford Park: Mother, Teen & Child Shot, Man Arrested

Four days before Valentine's Day on Feb. 14, tragedy struck the Bedford Park community by Valentine's Avenue and East 203rd Street once more, as a mother, a teen, and a young child were gunned down in their home in the early hours of Saturday morning, Feb. 10. The woman is dead, while her two children are stable, police said.

Police later confirmed a 37-yearold man was taken into custody and charged in connection to the incident. According to the NYPD, on Saturday, Feb. 10, at around 5.13 a.m., officers from the 52nd Precinct responded to a 911 call regarding an assault in progress inside 226 East 203rd Street.

"Upon arrival, they observed a 40-year-old woman who had been shot multiple times in the upper torso, a 16-year-old male shot once in the buttocks, and an 8-year-old male shot once in the left arm. EMS responded to the location and transported the 40-year-old female and 16-year-old male victims to St. Barnabas Hospital and the 8-year-old male victim was transported to NYC Health and Hospitals/Jacobi," an NYPD spokesperson said.

"The 16-year-old male and 8-year-old male are both listed in stable condition. The 40-year-old female victim was later pronounced deceased at the hospital," the spokesperson added. Police later said the deceased was identified Saida Bonilla Mejia, 40, of 226 East 203rd Street. Pursuant to an ongoing investigation,


they said Rosvin A. Mejia Castillo, 37, of the same address was arrested and charged the same day at 12.15 p.m. at the 52nd Precinct.

Mejia Castillo has been charged with murder, two counts of attempted murder, three counts of assault, attempted assault, six counts of criminal possession of a weapon, and two counts of endangering the welfare of a child. The 52nd Precinct Community Affairs team later said the fatal victim had been shot in her throat, abdomen, and upper back, and that the incident appeared to be "domestic related."

We spoke with one woman who lives

in the building, who declined to be identified and who said she didn't know the victim. Speaking in Spanish, she told *Norwood News*, "I arrived at like 3.40 a.m. at the building [on Saturday morning]. Really, I didn't see anything. When

The Power (and Joy) of Reading

Latinos Urbanos Book Club and the 4Bronx Project unveiled a new community library box, "Kingsbridge Community Library," outside P.S. 207 on Godwin Terrace in Kingsbridge on Feb. 15.

Laura Levine-Pinedo of the 4Bronx Project, told News 12 The Bronx on the day of the launch, "Power is knowledge and having kids have access to books right here on the sidewalk - anybody can come up, take a book, leave a book - I think it's a big win for the borough."

According to its website, the 4Bronx Project is a community service program focused on supporting the underserved and bringing diversity and inclusion to the community. The concept of free community library boxes has grown steadily in the last decade, driven, no doubt, by the closure in 2016 of the last brick-and-mortar Barnes & Noble bookstore in the borough.

While, fortunately, this is no longer the case, and some physical bookstores like The Lit. Bar in Mott Haven can still be found, they are still few and

far between. The award-winning "1.5 Million" documentary by Bronx film-maker, Gregory Hernandez, also co-

founder of Bronx Film 48, chronicles an intimate journey into the borough's literacy crisis, and explores the political and economic forces that gave rise to it, including lack of access to books.

According to the documentary, as of 2016, only 56% of Bronx high school graduates were college-ready, and 70 percent of South Bronx third grade students were unable to read at their grade level. Meanwhile, NYC Department of Education (DOE) found that children who fail to meet the third-grade benchmark are more likely to drop-out of high school and remain in poverty.

The new Kingsbridge Community Library box launch comes as officials from the nearby Kingsbridge public library announced its reopening on Feb. 14, after closing temporarily in late January for repairs to the building's heating system.

Among many other groups, The Bronx is Reading is an organization that promotes literacy and fosters a love of reading among children, teens, and adults through multidimensional initiatives. These include the annual

Norwood: Jewelry Store Heist on East 204th Street

A burglary at a jewelry store located at 286A East 204th Street in Norwood in the early hours of Wednesday, Feb. 21, resulted in the theft of \$1,100 worth of property, police said. Police said the break-in took place at around 5.05 a.m. They reported no injuries, and no description of a suspect(s) was immediately available.

We spoke to the business owner of the Wine & Liquor store located next door to the affected business who had just arrived at work later on Wednesday morning and he said he had called the affected business owner and he had not picked up. However, he said police officers told him later that the jewelry store business owner had been seen in the area on Wednesday morning and was unharmed.

The owner of the liquor store described his business neighbor as being around 50 years old and said like him, he was Asian. Other neighboring business owners did not know anything about what had happened.

One resident later commented that there didn't appear to be much inventory in the jewelry store and that it was not always open every day.

A construction worker chatting with a colleague on the other side of the street (where Foodtown is located) said he didn't know what happened but added, "The people, they are crazy." He added that he often saw people fighting in the street especially around Decatur Avenue and East 204th

The rapper also won a second award for Collaboration Song of the Year for "Barbie World," from the motion picture "Barbie," together with Nicki Minaj and Aqua, beating "All My Life," by Lil Durk Feat. J. Cole. Born Isis Naija Gaston on Jan. 1, 2000, according to Wikipedia, the millennial rapper is fast becoming the voice of her generation. She rose to prominence in 2022 with her song "Munch (Feelin' U), followed by "Bikini Bottom," and "In Ha Mood," from her 2023 EP "Like...?"

the police came at around 5.15 [a.m.] more or less, there was blood seen on the [security] camera. In the camera, nobody was seen leaving. Only the police were seen leaving but they [neighbors] say it was the boyfriend of the victim. I never saw him."

Asked how she felt about the situation, the woman said, "Well, it's very sad. A mother.. you know? A human being who is losing her life for... Nobody in these days has feelings, it seems, to just kill another person, as if it were nothing and it's very sad what happened." Asked if she was aware of any problems like drugs in the building, she said, "I don't think so. I don't know anything."

Norwood News spoke to a cousin of the victim who confirmed she had two children. The cousin, a young man who we met on 203rd Street, who we are not identifying, said he received a

call from another cousin at around 9.40 a.m. on Saturday when he happened to be at the hospital with his own father who he said had been taken in with diabetes issues a few days earlier. He said a male cousin told him about the shooting of their mutual cousin, Bonilla Mejia.

He said, "'You heard about that?' but I didn't know anything." The young man said that he thought the male cousin who was calling him was trying to reach his father but as he was hospitalized, he reached him instead.

"And then he told me somebody murdered my cousin. I said, 'What?' He said, 'Yeah, somebody murdered my cousin.' I said, 'Who?' 'They killed her,' [his male cousin said]. They killed her? For what?"

Asked what he thought happened, the young man said, "Right now, man, I don't think nothing. My mind, right now, is like uh.. [gestures that he is

> traumatized]. I think a lot of things. Why they do to her... why they come and shooting...why they kill her."

Asked if he knew if his cousin had been in a domestic violence situation, he declined to answer directly. He later said, "Why they kill them like that? Why are they shooting? Why? If you got problems with her, why you don't talk to fix the problem? If you don't... why? If you don't want to live with her no more, okay, you can leave or whatever. You don't have to... you don't have to kill somebody too, you know? Yeah and then, I don't know. I don't know. I can't..."

Of his female cousin, the young man then continued,

"Right now, I'm a little shocked because she's a happy girl."

Last year, as reported, two people were hospitalized after a Valentine's Day stabbing on nearby Valentine Avenue. Meanwhile, two people were also arrested for attempted murder following a separate shooting on the block in April 2023.

Gunman Sought in Bedford Park Shooting

NYPD detectives are looking for the gunman who shot a man in the hand on Marion Avenue in Bedford Park. According to police, the gunfire erupted at 10:20 a.m. on Monday, Jan. 15, when officers from the 52nd Precinct were called to 2700 Marion Avenue, between East 195th Street and East 196th Street, for a report of a person shot.

A police spokesperson told *Norwood News*, "Upon arrival of police to the location, a 32-year-old male reported that he was engaged in a dispute with an unknown male in front of the location." He added, "The unknown individual displayed a black firearm and shot him in the right hand."

Police said EMS transported the still-unidentified victim to St. Barnabas Hospital, where he was reported to be in "stable" condition. Police have reported no arrests and although there is a camera in front of the building, they said no suspect description was available. *Norwood News* reached out to the Dream Reality Corporation, believed to be the building's property manager. We did not receive an immediate response.

Fordham Manor: Person Sought for Stabbing inside Home

The NYPD is asking for the public's assistance identifying the person seen in the accompanying photo above who they say is sought in connection to an assault that occurred in Fordham

Manor. Police said that on Monday, Feb. 12, at around 00.25 a.m., the victim, a 29-year-old woman, got into a verbal dispute with another person inside 384 East 194th Street.

They said that during the dispute, the second person displayed a knife and allegedly stabbed the victim in the torso, before fleeing on foot westbound on East 194th Street to parts unknown. "The victim was transported to St. Barnabas Hospital in stable condition," police said. They said the person sought is described as female, has a light complexion, dark, long hair, and a slim build. They said she was last seen wearing multi-colored sneakers, black sweatpants, and a black sweatshirt.

Belmont: Harlem Man Dies in Hit & Run, Norwood Man Arrested

A 35-year-old man from Harlem has died following a hit and run in Belmont, police said, and a Norwood man has been arrested in connection with the incident. Police said that on Friday, Feb. 16, at around 7.39 p.m., police responded to a 911 call regarding a vehicle collision at the intersection of East 183rd Street and Park Avenue.

"Upon arrival, officers observed a 35-year-old male conscious and alert," they said. "EMS responded and transported the male victim to St. Barnabas Hospital where he was subsequently pronounced deceased." Police said that further investigation determined that the man had been driving a two-wheeled, gaspowered moped southbound on Park Avenue and had been crossing East 183rd Street when he struck the driver side of a black sedan that had been traveling eastbound on East 183rd Street.

They said the driver of the sedan did not remain at the scene. "The vehicle was last seen making a right turn onto Washington Avenue from East 183rd Street," police said. The investigation remained ongoing by the NYPD Highway District's Collision Investigation Squad (CIS), and they later confirmed that pursuant to an ongoing investigation, Emilio Galvan, 25, of Hull Avenue in Norwood was arrested on Saturday, Feb. 17, at noon. The deceased has been identified as Williams Cruz, 35, of West 144th Street in Harlem.

Police said Galvan was charged with leaving the scene of an accident and driving a motor vehicle without insurance. With CIS investigations, the NYPD handles all criminal aspects of the investigation, while NYC Department of Transportation (DOT) reviews the street design at the locations of such crashes.

Norwood: One Sought in Gang Robbery

The NYPD is asking for the public's help identifying the people seen in the accompanying top right image who they say are sought in connection to a robbery that occurred in Norwood. Police said that on Sunday, Jan. 28, at around



3 a.m., a 42-year-old male victim was in the vicinity of 3599 Bainbridge Avenue when five as-yet unidentified males approached him. They said the group, acting in concert, pushed the victim to the ground and stole his wallet and sneak-

They said the five then fled on foot, southbound on Bainbridge Avenue and the victim sustained minor injuries and did not seek medical attention on scene.

Norwood Break-In

On Thursday, Feb. 8, police said at around 12.41 p.m. at 3320 Reservoir East in Norwood, police received a 911 call from a person who said a trespasser broke into the living room window of her apartment in the residential building. Police said it seems the resident was out of the country at the time of the break-in and may have seen the trespasser enter the apartment on a security camera.

They said officers intercepted the male trespasser and added that the victim told them the person who broke in was not allowed to be there. They said no property was removed and the female resident declined to press charges. We asked the police press office if the tres-

passer was known to the victim, and they said this was not clear.

The following evening, Feb. 9, at around 7 p.m., around four separate police vehicles were seen patrolling the Williamsbridge Oval after dark. One middle-aged man who was in the park walking his dog on Friday evening told *Norwood News* he had noticed additional police presence in the park since Monday, Feb. 5, after dark.

Norwood News contacted the NYPD that evening to ask if there was a particular reason for the extra police presence in the Reservoir Oval and a spokesperson said they could not really say but added there was no record of any specific incident ongoing in the Oval at that time.

Kingsbridge Shooting Victim "Never had a Father or Mother, Tried to Survive"

As a group of young men continued a vigil for their friend for a third day on Feb. 10 outside FM Candy and Grocery Corp in Kingsbridge Heights, residents of NYCHA's Bailey Houses, located on Heath Avenue in Fordham Manor, also remembered resident, Hasan Richburg, 26, who was shot multiple times outside the Kingsbridge store, located at 131 West Kingsbridge Road, on Thursday, Feb. 8. He later died of his injuries.

Police have since arrested a 46-year-old man in connection with the incident, which they said occurred at around 10.56 a.m. After responding to a 911 call, they said, upon arrival, officers from the 50th Precinct discovered the man lying on the street with multiple gunshot wounds to the torso.

They said he was transported by EMS to St. Barnabas Hospital, where he was later pronounced deceased. News 12 The Bronx said a witness reported seeing him try to run a few doors down the block from the location before falling in front of Caridad restaurant.

One female employee of a local store said a resident reported seeing emergency staff attempting to carry out CPR on the victim as they lifted him into a waiting ambulance.

On Feb. 14, police said that pursuant to an ongoing investigation, Deshaun Coleman, 46, of Sedgwick Avenue in Kingsbridge Heights, was arrested at 8.15 a.m. in The Bronx. They said he was charged with murder and criminal possession of a weapon.

Bronx Book Festival, the Bronx is Reading Literacy Program, monthly book club meetings, and pop up and online stores. The first Bronx Book Festival was held on Fordham Plaza in May 2018 and aims to promote literacy and foster a love of reading among children, teens, and adults.

As reported, Brandon Montes of Norwood Community Library's grab-and-go library system previously told *Norwood News* he'd been doing whatever he could to informally share books with the community through pop-up book events since 2019. In July 2021, the Norwood Community Library's first community library box was opened outside the Keeper's House on the Reservoir Oval in Norwood.

In October 2023, Montes opened the library's second library box at Norwood's North Central Bronx Hospital, located at 3424 Kossuth Avenue. "A good book has the power to stay with you for a lifetime," Montes said at the time. "I wanted to help my whole neighborhood experience that feeling."

Other groups like Bronx Bound Books took the alternate library concept further amid the COVID-19 pandemic. Founder, Latanya DeVaughn, drove around the borough in a mobile bus library, similar to what NYPL had done during school and public library building renovations.

The mobile buses allow kids climb aboard and choose a book of their liking. The initiative was so successful, DeVaughn began operating a book kiosk inside Baychester's Mall at Bay Plaza in October 2023, with plans now afoot to build a permanent brick-and-

mortar store in 2024 via a GoFundMe initiative.

Latinos Urbanos Book Club has also partnered with Norwood Community Library visiting various City schools in recent months, handing out backpacks filled with school supplies and books donated by the community library. The club are also funded by donations from associations affiliated with renowned Puerto Rican rapper, Bad Bunny. One of their recent Bronx giveaways was at M.S. 244 The New School for Leadership and the Arts in Kingsbridge Heights.

Books in different languages are still much needed. In 2019, Dr. Joan Kong, principle of P.S. X11 in Highbridge, said English was not the primary language for many of the school's students. "They are coming to us not knowing the language," she said. "Our libraries are de-

prived of those types of resources."

Kong's long-held belief in the power of education led her and her colleagues to campaign for better library services for the school, in the belief that when a real library is provided to kids, it instills in them not only a love of reading but a life-long research skill.

Another player who advocates for literacy across the borough is Bronx poet and spoken word artist, Lorraine Currelley. Executive director of both the Bronx Book Fair and the Poets Network & Exchange, Currelley leads a group of fellow word lovers on a mission to expand literacy in The Bronx, providing workshops for writers and promoting storytelling by underrepresented groups in the literary world.

Currelley told *Norwood News* in 2020, "We need to address the issues affecting

our community, like obesity, hyper-tension, and other health issues," she said. "We need to utilize resources to bring attention to mental health issues. We don't want to be just a literary group."

With more and more community libraries popping up around the borough, hopefully the next generation of readers will continue to be equipped to do just

On Saturday, Feb. 10, Norwood News visited Bailey Houses and spoke to several residents who had watched the young man grow up there. One woman who declined to be identified was sitting with another woman outside the building, where another makeshift memorial of candles and photographs had been left by residents in tribute to the latest young victim of gun violence. The woman recalled, "He was a good kid. He never bothered anyone in this building."

The woman continued, "When he was younger, he lived with his mom and dad and his three brothers. They were wonderful people and he never, never got nasty with anyone here. He was so respectful around his neighbors."

Asked if people in the building had heard about the circumstances around the shooting of Richburg, the second woman, who also declined to be identified, said she heard he had sought refuge inside the FM Candy and Grocery, while the first woman added, "Going in, they shot him in the back and when he turned around, they finished him off."

Another male resident who also declined to be identified said he had known Richburg

while he lived in the building for the last 15 years. "Most of the time I didn't see him much because he was in prison," the resident said. He added that he did not know why Richburg was in prison, saying, "It wasn't for anything good."

"I think he was in some kind of gang," the resident continued. "I think he quit the gang because he tried to find a job and he was doing good the last couple of weeks." Norwood News reached out to City and State authorities for details of any prior arrests / convictions for Richburg. We did not receive an immediate response.

The same resident also alleged a relative of Richburg's was currently in jail and sympathized, noting that both parents of the victim died years ago. The resident said he felt very sorry for Richburg because he said it was not his fault. He added, "He never had a father or mother and he tried to survive."

Norwood News visited the FM Candy and Grocery Store on Feb. 10 and was told no video of the shooting was available, although a camera was seen outside the store.

The shooting may have been the first for 2024 in the 50th Precinct. Data from the NYPD shows that *as of Feb.* 4, there were zero year-to-date shootings in 50th Precinct, the same as last year. The pre-

cinct broadly covers the neighborhoods of Kingsbridge, Marble Hill, Fieldston, Riverdale and Spuyten Duyvil, as well as Van Cortlandt Park.

Unfortunately, that overview for the 50th Precinct is not reflective of the situation when it comes to shootings in the borough as a whole. As of Feb. 4, there were 24 shootings in The Bronx this year, according to NYPD data, up from 22 during the same period last year. Meanwhile, 29 victims had been shot as of the same date across the borough, compared to 27 during the same period last year.

According to the NYPD, as of Feb. 8 and since Jan. 1, 2022, 14,218 guns have been removed from New York City streets, 628 of those since Jan. 1, 2024. Coleman is deemed innocent unless and until convicted in a court of law.



Guy's heart stopped twice. Back coaching days later.

said. Asked how she and Octavio met, she said, "I was in university in Santo Domingo in the Dominican Republic, studying to become a teacher and that's where we met, and from then on....."

We asked what was the secret that has kept them together for 45 years. "Understanding," she said. In terms of the qualities her husband possesses that she appreciates, Maria Altagracia said, "Oh, he's a person who gives me my freedom. I don't have any problems to go out." Her sister added, "He trusts her."

We also asked what quality she first saw in Octavio that made her fall in love with him. "He's a workhorse," Maria Altagracia replied. "He's honorable and honest."

Later we spoke to Omari and Tayler who are both over 18, are friends, but not in a relationship. We asked for their thoughts on what makes for a good relationship these days. Omari said, "I would say communication." Tayler agreed. "Respect, loyalty, trust," she added. Omari added, "You have to trust your partner. You have to trust that they'll respect you when you're not around."

Asked what was the first thing that attracted them to other people, Omari said, "I would say looks, I'm not gonna lie." Tayler, meanwhile, replied, "I'd say personality or if a person's funny."

We asked if, in their opinion, they felt having common interests e.g. in sports or music was a good basis for a relationship. They both agreed but were not completely sold on the idea. Asked if they have been in relationships already, Omari was more vocal in his affirmative response. We also asked what the best part was about being in a relationship. Omari said, "I would say being able to do something that you enjoy with somebody else."

The alternate "Galentine's Day," popularized by the TV series "Parks & Recreation," is marked by some single people in February who perhaps feel

a bit out of sorts when it comes to the pressures of Valentine's Day, but still wish to mark the occasion in some way among friends.

Mary Kennedy, a resident of Norwood who is originally from Sydney, Australia, told *Norwood News*, "I think I'm past feeling out of sorts. Like, I just feel blessed with my life in general." With one marriage now over, Kennedy said, "Sometimes, you've got to walk through the fire to get to a better place and so, I've found myself in a beautiful apartment. I keep in touch with friends from Australia. My neighbors in the building are gorgeous. I've struck up some really beautiful friendships."

She continued, "My neighbors and I started this nice tradition of cocktail parties, fine dining with my mixology course [the creation and innovation of cocktails]. Kennedy works as a nurse in Manhattan. "I've struck up a couple of solid friendships with nurses, so I just think that I'm pretty content," she said.

We asked if she had witnessed a lot of love firsthand in her capacity as a nurse during the pandemic when so many were saying goodbye to loved ones on a regular basis. "Unfortunately, some of them didn't get to say goodbye," she said. "Remember that it was prevaccine so it was very scary."

She added, "I work in emergency psych now so it's the ER part but psychiatric. Prior to that, I was on the unit. The sad thing is those nurses really suffered. Some died, you know? Some got really sick. Actually, quite a few nurses on my unit got sick. What was sad was just the ambulance bays...... just full of bodies. They were just, like, overflowing."

Kennedy said it was sad when people died and didn't have their loved ones with them. "That's terrible. When they drew their last breath, they weren't...." she said, without finishing her sentence.

We mentioned how from the outside, the public was led to believe nurses were doing their best to step in, fill the void, and stay with patients in their

final hours. "I mean, I hope so.....depending on how busy it was," Kennedy said. "I mean they would have been with them for sure, but whether they would have been holding their hand and really present, really present, when they were taking their last breaths... I don't know."

The Aussie native said she was also happy to have developed some good friendships within the chess community even though after her marriage broke up, she initially felt a bit ostracized from that community. Her ex-husband is a prominent chess master.

"It just kind of happened naturally, organically," she said of those friendships. "It didn't happen immediately. It took a couple of years, but then those friendships are beautiful, and even in the Bronx, there's a lot of potential within the chess community. A friend of mine actually teaches chess in an assisted living [complex] in Bronxwood."

We mentioned how chess has been popularized in recent years by the Netflix series, "The Queen's Gambit," and how NYPL and the Bronx borough president have been organizing chess classes and contests for kids. "That's cool," Kennedy said. "I wish there was more stuff like that for adults. I never really got into chess until we broke up because the marriage was so stressful,

which is ridiculous."

She continued, "So, Valentine's Day is fine. I think it's beautiful for those people who want to, like, celebrate something special. To me, it is nothing negative. It's just a day of love as far as I'm concerned." Kennedy added that she had even received some cute messages from two chess playing friends who called her to wish her a happy Valentine's Day. "Like, I don't feel lonely, and it would take a lot for me to want to get into a romantic relationship again," she said. "I'm pretty fussy."

We asked if she had any advice for younger people entering into relationships in 2024. Referencing another prior relationship, Kennedy said, "My official advice would be no matter how charming or charismatic...... it's very hard though when you're young. You don't always take advice to heart. You have to learn your own lessons, but my advice would be, if I had kids, I'd be making them very wary about anyone who had a temper, and how they channel their anger. Now, I'm very much aware of that."

She concluded, "My radar is so finely tuned [now]. So, I would say anyone who's quick to anger, has a temper, and if they've ever had any history of laying hands on anyone, especially a woman, like, just don't go there."

Fun in the Snow despite Tech Glitch






